The attendants were in their places. The four little flower girls (ages 1-1/2 to 4 yrs.) had made it down the aisle without breaking stride, focused as they were on scattering tissue paper petals along the way. The groom was waiting for his bride and love was in the air. This part of the wedding was accomplished amid the strains of *Come Thou Font of Every Blessing*.

Soon, the entire church, packed with over 200 invited guests, waited to hear the familiar first strains of Mendelssohn's Wedding March or some other such familiar wedding march that would announce the entrance of our granddaughter, Liz, as she walked (floated?) to meet the love of her life on the arm of her father (our son, Tony). I guess I shouldn't have been surprised when she finally appeared and The Litany of the Saints burst forthin a clear and ethereal invocation of the Saints whom the bride and groom had always considered friends and helpers throughout their five year courtship. The only other time I remember being swept away by this beautiful chant invoking all the Saints was at the ordination of a young priest several years ago. For me, it had been the most powerful and moving part of the priestly ceremony and commission.

Coincidentally, just the night before, I had invoked these same saints, as well as Mary and any other angels within hearing distance, to be with me during my own walk to the lectern today to do the first reading. I'd been astonished when Liz and asked me if I would be willing to do this and felt it a high honor, so I accepted quickly--before she could change her mind. "I know you can do it, Nana," she said, "But maybe you should come to the wedding rehearsal anyway—just to get used to the stairs."

I had cause for concern when I got to the beautiful church of St. Mary's in Bristol, R.I., for the Friday afternoon wedding rehearsal and saw the many marble steps interspersed with broad landings leading to the final step to the lectern. No railings were in sight!

Would I be able to navigate the walk in my new slingbacks? I wondered. Plus move through that relatively narrow space around the bride and groom... and climb the marble steps-with-no-railings to the lectern without stumbling? Would my voice come through loud and clear, my nose not run, my eyes not jump ahead of my lines?

Well, suddenly it was Saturday afternoon and the wedding was in full swing. As described above, all had gone beautifully so far with everyone playing his or The bride and groom were her part to perfection. seated and waiting calmly for the first reading. As my husband nudged me on, and those in the pew made room for me to pass, I sent one more prayer heavenward and my son Tony stood to let me exit the pew. I breathed a sigh of gratitude as he took my hand in a firm grip and guided me ever so carefully around the wedding couple and delivered me safely to the lectern that had seemed so far away. He waited a short distance behind me while I spoke the first sentence. "A reading from the book of Genesis..." I remember wondering whether that voice so loud and clear could possibly be mine. I looked down at the smiling and beautiful faces of the bride and groom and felt completely relaxed as I heard myself speaking the rest of the selection directly to them.

When I was finished with the reading, and my son had guided me safely back to my seat, I experienced the rest of this unimaginably beautiful and profoundly Catholic wedding as an actual meeting between heaven and earth. It seemed that the combined prayers of everyone present for this couple had been answered. Liz and Bob's dream had become a reality and gone as perfectly as it had been planned.

For helping me to play my small part in my granddaughter's wedding without a misstep or falter, I expect that God may ask me for something in return. That may sound like a "this for that" relationship, but I think of it as an unspoken agreement on my part to answer His call as I hear it along the way. *It's never been more than I can handle*.



# Book Review by Alison Norton

Title: Still Alice
Author: Lisa Genova
Published: 2007



**Note**: This is author Lisa Genova's debut novel. She holds a PhD in neuroscience from Harvard and this first novel was self published. She is also an online columnist for the National Alzheimer's Association.

Our protagonist, Alice Howland, is a 50 year old Harvard professor of cognitive psychology and an accomplished expert in the field of linguistics. She is comfortably enjoying the ebb and flow of her middle aged life until an abrupt interruption occurs. She begins to experience nagging instances of memory loss, disorientation in familiar places and absent mindedness that she finds irritatingly unexplainable. After an exhausting gamut of tests that rule out menopause, depression and a brain tumor, the diagnosis of early onset Alzheimer's Disease was a difficult reality to accept.

Thus begins our journey along with Alice through the ups and downs of coming to grips with her new life. We take this road with Alice, right along side her and from her point of view. Ms. Genova places the reader in the very mind of Alice as we feel her confusion, anguish, pain and joy of her life. We experience the reactions of her husband and children who respond in very different ways to the news of their wife and mother's future as well as the future of their own lives as the disease is hereditary. Although we learn of intimate family details and reactions, we are always seeing things from Alice's perspective. We travel from the early to the end stages of the disease's progression and have a bird's eye view of what Alice feels.

This book is an accurate and heartbreaking portrayal of a woman's life with Alzheimer's Disease. It is so real in its depiction that it was approved by the Alzheimer's Association and has received acclaim from them. Ms. Genova hopes the reader will have a greater sensitivity and understanding of those affected by Alzheimer's Disease. This book is a true page turner that will stir your emotions when you read it. You, as the reader will form an attachment to Alice and the story will linger with you long after the last page is done.

## **Earth Friendly Coffee**

On the second weekend of each month, Earth Friendly Fair Trade Coffee is sold after the Saturday and Sunday Masses. The Earth Friendly Coffee Company is a social justice initiative doing business as a fair trade coffee company. Friendly Company provides an American market for the Mayan coffee growers from the rainforest of Guatemala. One of the goals of the Earth Friendly Foundation has been to purchase a roaster for the Mayan coffee growers so that eventually they will be able to mill, process, roast and export the coffee that they grow. The greater involvement these farmers achieve in the supply chain of the world coffee market, the greater their revenue and the greater their ability to care for their own health and education within their own culture. I recently spoke with Diane Hughes, the founder of Earth Friendly Coffee. She was excited to share the news that through the support of Rotary International, the farmers may soon have their coffee roaster. Earth Friendly is now expanding their efforts to provide a market for other fair trade coffee growers in Africa and Asia. Thank you OLG parishioners for helping the Mayan people maintain their culture and our rainforest.

"Making the sandwiches made me feel happy because people on the street were getting food."


"I felt happy making sandwiches for people who did not have the money to make them."
