HEAR YE HEAR YE!

Fellow Parishioners:

On the weekend of June 8, 9 we heard Fr. Peter announce that his request for retirement was accepted by Bishop Ed. We are writing to let you know what that means for us at OLG.

A little background: there are 126 parishes in the Albany Diocese being covered by 78 active priests. The end of June will see 4 other parish leaders retiring. Fr. Peter retires on September 30. The diocese has been assisting parishes when a priest retires or accepts another assignment.

We the undersigned met with Deacon Frank Berning, Director of Pastoral Planning for the diocese. He outlined for us the plan that the diocese has been using to support parishes whose pastor is retiring or being transferred for another assignment.

An interim team consisting of a priest and administrator will be assigned to the parish during a transitional period. This team will be in place for a period of 3 to 9 months. The interim priest, probably not his only assignment, will celebrate weekend Mass and when available other sacraments.

The administrator will most likely be available for a day a week in an oversight capacity. The administrator will assist us in making connections with diocesan resources to address our needs. The administrator will coordinate drafting a parish profile of OLG with our input regarding parish needs and our ties with St. Joseph's Parish in Scotia. We will commit to keeping you up to date. For now we need to support Fr. Russo and continue to strengthen our parish.

My Walk With God

In July 2016, I deleted my inbox and saved my deleted box. This strange event reinforced my journey of trust in the Lord. I visited my GP, and he immediately directed me to Ellis Hospital. He assumed I was having a stroke because the right side of my face was drooping. The MRI revealed a 1 ½" tumor in the front of the brain, and the neurosurgeon opinioned that it was benign meningioma. I was uneasy about this diagnosis and the Holy Spirit directed me elsewhere for further diagnosis. With Deacon Frank's help, I pursued referrals at Albany Med. I chose the top physician on the list, Dr. D. Semenoff, and was amazed when he himself answered his phone. Was this coincidence? I think not. He explained he was giving his secretary a short break, and my timing was excellent. He just received a cancellation, which I filled with deep appreciation. At that visit, Dr. S. diagnosed the MRI taken at Ellis and assured me that the tumor was indeed cancerous and needed to be removed immediately (since it had grown significantly in the last three years, comparing to old MRI.)

Surgery lasted perhaps four hours, according to my family. The biopsy indicated the tumor to be Primary Lymphoma CNS (central nervous system). This was actually a cancer of blood, for which there was a chemotherapy treatment that was effective in 70% of the cases. So I pursued this plan of treatment for 14 weeks with poor results. My kidneys failed and I developed neuropathy in both feet. This was such a difficult time for me. Ardith, my wife, has with me every step of the way. Although I was feeling discouraged, I somehow knew that God had something more in store for me.

In the meantime, my son Kevin, researched his computer and found a Primary Lymphoma CNS trial starting at Dana Farber in Boston, March 2017. He contacted Dr. Lakshmi Nayak at the Center for Neuro-Oncology and set up an appointment the following Wednesday. Because of my age, she was not able to get me into this trial. However, she had a patient in my age bracket with the same diagnosis, who had done well on nivolumab (immunotherapy)-in fact, he was in remission. I went into Dana-Farber in a wheelchair. I was not in good shape. The new MRI indicated the tumor was growing again. I welcomed another opportunity to deal with this grisly growth in my head.

Dr. Nayak decided to shrink the tumor with pinpoint radiation, as opposed to whole brain radiation. This took place over 5 days, with no side effects. She kindly convinced the drug company which produces Optivo to approve its use for me based on the success of patient #1 (previously only FDA approved for lung cancer.) I started treatment 3-2017, and the tumor has shrunk to the size of a dime. It is not growing and I feel so much better. From wheelchair, to walker, to a cane, and now walking on my own, I feel so blessed that this 2.5 year regimen is working for me. One week on, one week off, all of us working in unchartered waters. (I am hopeful that one day I will be referred to as patient #2.)

During this entire ordeal, I never had a thought or feeling that I would die. Somehow I knew that Christ was walking with me. Look at the number of "coincidences" that led me to write this testimony today. I am so very grateful to the parishioners of OLG for your prayers and support. Please believe me when I say that I have felt and benefitted from your sustenance. I especially wish to thank my wife, Ardith, Deacon Frank Thomas for his professional direction, and also Patti Shepherd, Joyce Boice and Sue Cafariella for the letters of encouragement. Knowing that I had and still have the support of this OLG community has kept me going for the past 2+ years. God bless you and please, "keep those prayers coming"!!!

With the arrival of spring and summer, OLG has launched the annual Bishop's Appeal in May while planning and coordination continues for the Re-Ignite the Faith Campaign, which will soon follow. There is an important difference between each which the council feels all parishioners need to be aware of.

The Bishop's Appeal is built around a financial assessment that each parish in the diocese must meet in order to fund and fulfill diocesan-wide obligations. OLG and its membership benefit both directly and indirectly from the many programs which the appeal supports. Shortfalls in a parish's donation levels become a debt and is carried forward. Each parish is responsible for making up shortfalls. For this reason, parishes try to reach or exceed assessed goals during the annual campaign period.

The Re-Ignite the Faith campaign is very different. Parishes have goals to reach and 70 percent of the proceeds are to be used in the parish to meet specific objectives. There is no assessment from the diocese under this effort. Shortages in the stated goal will limit the parish's ability to complete an objective but there is no debt incurred.

As reported in our last newsletter, Fr. Peter Russo sent a letter in March to the Bishop seeking permission to retire by his 70th birthday near the end of September. The Bishop has given him the OK! Congratulations Father! The parish council has reached out to the diocese pastoral planning office to begin a dialogue about how the administrative needs of OLG can be addressed going forward. The council will report further on this as information is obtained.

Men's Health-You Are Different!

Overall, Americans do live longer, but American men still do not live as long as American women.

The research still cannot determine why this phenomenon occurs. The research does say that men may not take care of themselves as well as women do. Men may engage in more "risky behaviors" than women-like drinking and smoking. Men may not have a primary health care provider where women may have two (gynecologist and primary care providers).

Tips for men to care for themselves:

- 1. See health care provider once a year.
- 2. See primary care provider promptly when not feeling well.
- 3. Take ALL medications (including over-the-counter medications and supplements) to health care provider on each visit. Take medications as prescribed.
- 4. Get your vaccinations per CDC schedule: Influenza, Pneumonia, Shingles and Tetanus/ Diphtheria booster.
- 5. Use sunscreen. Good for everyone!
- 6. Eat balanced diet.
- 7. Exercise to lower fall risk.
- 8. STOP smoking! Enough said.
- 9. Exercise your brain. Read, do puzzles, play card games, debate current issues.
- 10. Drink alcohol in moderation. Moderate drinking = 2 drinks daily for men.
- 11. Socialize with others. Join groups; get involved at church (hint, hint!)

Eleven Months Financial Report by Phil Salm

Total Income \$355,670 Total Expense 365,560 Gain/(Loss) (\$9,890)



The \$9890. loss shown above compares to a gain of \$11,195. for the 7/1/17-5/31/18 period. This is primarily because offertory collections are now \$28,016. less than for the July-May period of the prior fiscal year.

We have stopped making monthly payments to the Diocese for this year's School Assessment. Our annual assessment is \$32,019, of which a balance of \$18,678 remains an OLG obligation to the Diocese.

hmmm!

Overall, we need increased financial support to fund parish programs and to meet our obligations to the Diocese.

SALVATION ARMY LUNCH PROGRAM

The Salvation Army has been running a lunch program for those in need at their Schenectady Lafayette Street facility for many years supported by volunteers from Our Lady of Grace and other organizations throughout the area. Hot nutritious lunches are provided from Monday to Friday, feeding an average of 100+ on a daily basis.

Each organization is asked to commit to one day per month. OLG has two groups of teams (4 to 5 people on a team). Group one prepares the meals in the OLG kitchen on Wednesdays (day or evening) and group two transports the food from OLG and serves the meal at the Salvation Army facility on the next day. This is a 3 to 4 hour commitment.

We had been able to keep the frequency for teams to cook or serve to twice a year but have lost many volunteers for a variety of reasons. In order for OLG to keep supporting this much needed program we are reaching out to our parishioners for your help.

The interaction with the many families and individuals that you serve is humbling and priceless and costs only a few hours of your time! Please consider joining one of our teams and help make a difference in people's lives.
