My Walk With God by Terry Hynes

My name is Terry Hynes, I am 28 years old and I live in Saratoga Springs, New York. I was born in Latham New York, moved to Malta when I was 2, and then to Burnt Hills with my parents and little brother Riley, at the age of 5. I grew up in a Catholic family. My Mom was/is a believer in Christ, but my Dad never became a follower. (I prayed each day that my Dad and brother would come to believe.)

My father did not want me to be baptized as an infant. Growing up, I had always believed, but I never really knew just who God truly was and what He did for me. My first visit to a church was for a distant family funeral. The second visit was for a family wedding. I had always thought that churches were for weddings and funerals. I never knew that it held a much bigger purpose.

My parents were divorced when I was 13, and my life changed dramatically. I attended Young Life Club when I was 16, a Christian Club that helps bring young adults closer to Jesus in a fun way. My mother hosted the club meetings at our house. Although I enjoyed going to club every Monday night, singing songs, playing fun silly games, I never knew the main purpose of Young Life until I was senior. When I was 17, I was called to something more and started attending mass with my Mom some weekends. We weren't able to go every week because of my brother, Riley's schedule. I started going to church more often after I graduated from high school.

I was up at Lake Champion with my Burnt Hills Young Life friends, a Young Life summer camp where kids would have the best week of their lives. Definitely the best week of my life, it was there that I finally gave my life to Christ. I received a NIV (new international version) Bible, given by the camp volunteers. In 2013, I told my Mom that I wanted to be baptized, something I wished happened to me a long time ago. My Mom managed to connect me with Sister Kathy, who helped to guide my every step of this new journey. My stepdad, Jim, is my Godfather, LeeAnn was my sponsor, and I had great support from other family members.

It's easier to be baptized as a baby than it is when you're an adult. As an adult, you have to go through a year of training. I started my journey on Easter, and had to wait twelve months to be baptized because there was so much to learn. I attended classes every Thursday night, and met with Sister Kathy during mass every Sunday. I also signed my name in a big book with others, both young and old, who were preparing for Baptism.

In April 2014, I was finally baptized on Easter Saturday, and received my first communion that same night. My journey to Baptism really brought me closer to knowing God, His Son Jesus, and the gift of the Holy Spirit. I learned how much God loved me, and why He sent his Son to earth to die for me. Through this experience, I had finally begun to realize why I was questioning myself in the mirror. I was always kind and generous to people, but there was something missing in my heart..... it was Jesus, the last piece to my puzzle.

Today, I am an active parishioner at OLG. I love weekly Mass. I help with the collections, lector: and serve as a greeter and decorator. I join my church group one day a month at the Regional Food Bank located at Albany Shaker Road. I also volunteer at Burnt Hills Young Life, the club that that helped me give my life to Jesus.

People ask me if I ever thought of becoming a Deacon, or a Catholic Priest. The truth is I have, but being a Deacon or a Priest is a huge responsibility. There would much to give up in life in order to follow this path, and it's still something I continue to think about each day. If I were to be called to the priesthood or deaconate, God will let me know, He always has ways of speaking to me. In closing, I thank God for everything that He has done for me, and has given to me. I would still be lost if He hadn't found me. My soul would still feel dead if He hadn't given me life. Today, God continues to walk alongside me, as he does for all those who also believe.


Hey Kids.....

Nurse's Corner

It is, Hi Neighbor Month!

Social connections are so important to your health! The Centers of Disease Control & Prevention (CDC) has a tool kit for community preparedness and a "to go" kit in case of an emergency. Neighbors can be a vital source of assistance during an emergency.

The tool kit can be found at https://www.ready.gov/community-preparedness-toolkit

The "to go" kit should have the following: Food, water and medical supplies to last at least 72 hours

- Assistive technology- Wheel chairs, walkers, hearing aids/batteries contacts, eyeglasses, asthma inhaler, epinephrine injector, blood glucose monitor/accessories
- ALL medications/prescriptions
- Medical and First-Aid supplies
- Infant/Child care supplies including toys/blankets
- Pet supplies including food and toys/beds or blankets.
- Food that does not need refrigeration or special preparation. One (1) gallon of water per person per day.

These items can be stored in a moveable travel bag or suitcase or plastic bin or duffle bag.

UPDATE these supplies every 6 months or as the family needs change.

I believe the beauty of having a spiritual resolution is the fruit and grace that comes from it as you do it. I am looking forward to seeing how The Word comes more alive to me over the course of this year and how that changes me and my ministry with our young people.

GROWING IN FAITH TOGETHER

In this season of New Year's resolutions, I think it is important to not only meditate on new or re-visited habits that lead to a healthier lifestyle, but also a healthier spiritual life. I was asked to share my Spiritual New Year's resolution in our tri-parish bulletin, but thought it may be fun and helpful to expand upon this information in Our Lady of Grace's newsletter, Our Christian Walk!

This year I am striving to acknowledge how God is present in my day to day life. It's so very easy to be caught up in the bustle of normal life, keeping our heads down, moving from one task to the next that we miss the little miracles that happen each day. My plan is that I will use two different tools to help keep my focus; my "Star Word", and my day planner.

Let's first focus on the concept of a Star Word! Within my position at our tri-parish community I'm offering a spiritual practice for anyone interested. In the month of January, on the At Home Formation bulletin board (next to the name tag table in the entrance of the church), there is a take-home lesson regarding Epiphany. This lesson includes an individualized "Star Word" handwritten on a star image.

A "Star Word " is a word that may seem like it's been randomly selected, but in fact has been selected for you by the Holy Spirit. The idea behind this practice is that by focusing on a specific God-sent word, we look for God in our midst. We change our perspective, and focus our attention amid all the distractions of daily life, while we seek to find the meaning of our word and when/why/how it "pops up". Within the take-home lesson there are tips and ideas on how to use your star word, and how to pray with it.

Other than my star word practice, I also plan on using my day planner to help keep my focus on my spiritual New Year's resolutions. Alongside my daily schedule I plan to jot down a list of things I'm grateful for, the ways I've felt God's presence during the day, and occurrences of finding my Star Word. As I write this article, I can say I am amazed by the amount of times my word has already popped up this year, and we are only 4 days in! Once your focus gradually shifts towards the divine, it's so much easier to experience God's presence, which in turn causes the rest of the day's tasks to seem much lighter!
